New Perspectives on Penwith

Welcome to the latest newsletter from the Penwith Landscape Partnership (PLP)

The three Communication and Interpretation projects that make up part of the work of the PLP aim to encourage everyone to interact with and learn more about in Penwith in new ways – whether online through our website (Virtual Landscape Hub), through the Cornish language with our Taking Names project, or a creative celebration through the arts based Seeing the Landscape project.

All three of these projects have continued to raise awareness of Penwith and its heritage in recent months. Notably, in the autumn of 2021 the Penwith Landscape Exploration Network, or PLEN, went live on our website. This new interactive platform uses a mixture of drone



and ground photography and filming to allow visitors to visit some of Penwith's most significant ancient sites and local landmarks online. This allows everyone to see how the different elements of the Penwith landscape are connected together and provide context for each other, and provides access to these sites for those that might otherwise find it difficult to visit them. It also showcases the beauty and history of this unique place. There are 24 sites on the PLEN at present, but more will be added in the future.

Creative souls had the opportunity to attend workshops and exhibitions to celebrate Penwith through art last year, and our Tinners' Way Art Competition invited entries showcasing aspects of Penwith focused around this ancient trackway. In the Adults category, gorgeous photographs, visual art works and written word pieces were entered, while children had the opportunity to design our new waymarkers to be placed in the landscape. While judging for the children's contest is still underway, we've been thrilled to announce the winners in our adults contest, and all the top placing entries can now be seen in galleries on our website.

Meanwhile, our Para Kernewek (Cornish language team) have continued to be hard at work with Cornish language taster sessions, guided walks and other Cornish related activities. Given its important place in Penwith's heritage, we've also been pleased to launch our Kernewek yn Pennwydh, or Cornish in Penwith web pages – including an interactive map of place names and dialect that will continue to be added to.

Historic hedges repaired at Cape Cornwall

We're thrilled to have organised some highly skilled hedge repairs take place on one of West Cornwall's most famous headlands, Cape Cornwall. The Hedges in this area are most distinctive, with very uniform and neat granite stones that have been carefully 'dressed' (worked with hammers), and laid in very straight rows (or 'courses'). The prominent hedge running over the 'saddle' of the headland had a number of collapses, and left alone stones would continue to fall. So PLP has helped the National Trust by



calling in expert Hedger Bruce Davies, who has painstakingly and carefully sorted and replaced the fallen stones, often working over head height. The hedge is now rebuilt beautifully, with only the slight difference in colour, the only clue as to the sites of repair. Over time even this will disappear as the lichens regrow over the stones, and as the hedge goes on facing the wind and rain on the Cape for many years to come.

PLP volunteer clinches Oxford place with tales of our Practical tasks

It's true that the numbers of young people who volunteer for practical tasks with the PLP are not as high as we'd like. School, college and the lure of Big Cities see many of our younger folk prefer not to spend a day out with us scrub bashing or hedge repairing. After Christmas Charlie joined us clearing scrub up on Lesingey round, and at coffee time he pulled out chocolates and biscuits for us to share and proceeded to heartily thank us for making him feel welcome. The reason he brought us the goodies? He'd just secured a place at Keeble College, Oxford, and told us that his interviewers were very impressed with his tales of getting his hands dirty with the PLP! So if you are reading this and know a younger individual who is keen on conservation, biology or the environment and wants to take it further, then we can now confidently say you will stand a better chance of getting that place at university if you volunteer with us!
